Dear Moraga-Orinda Fire District Board of Directors:

I wrote to you on February 13, 2022, regarding the proposed adoption of Ordinance 22–03. I have since received relevant information that should reduce the concerns that some have expressed, namely, that passage of the Ordinance will make it impossible to obtain and/or retain insurance on our property. I therefore present the following revised message.

I have been a Moraga resident for over 33 years. My daughter, son-in-law and three children have lived in their home on Sanders Drive for the last eight years. It was only a few years ago that a latenight grass fire threatened the homes at Sanders Ranch and those on Sanders Drive, among others in

the adjacent areas.

With the threat of fire becoming ever more alarming in our area, we need up-to-date maps that accurately depict the real dangers and trigger the needed policies and guidelines to best protect public safety and prioritize mitigation work in the district.

Doing so will not affect the availability of insurance. I have confirmed with my insurance company, State Farm, that they do not drop any of their clients due to the rezoning of one's property or entire sections within a town, city or larger region, even when the rezoning leads to a higher fire hazard designation.

Furthermore, insurance companies will be less inclined to change their policies or leave the market when they see a community and its residents squarely face the increasing risks of fire danger and then take steps to reduce that danger as we have done in removing dead and dangerous brush throughout our Town and around our homes.

Accordingly, we urge you to adopt Ordinance 22-03 to re-designate the MOFD's high fire hazard severity zones within its local responsibility area to very high.



We are writing to express our support for the adoption of Ordinance 22-03. First, however, we want to express our sincere appreciation to the District for the critical work it is doing to help the Moraga-Orinda-Canyon community become better educated about and prepared for wildfire.

The District's outreach and support efforts—including the Chief's excellent community presentations explaining the risks, District staff's consultations to help residents improve defensible space, and the MOFD chipping program—have very directly helped us do a much better job preparing our home and our family to survive a wildfire.

We are also grateful for MOFD's ongoing work to secure funding for additional shaded firebreaks, and that it is collaborating with natural-resource agencies and organizations to take a balanced approach to protecting habitat and environmental resources while significantly reducing the ability of wildfire to spread through the community.

Within this context of MOFD's many efforts to respond adequately to rapidly increasing fire dangers, we write in support of Ordinance 22-03 before you tonight. As important as all the aforementioned strategies are, the District cannot mitigate our area's fire risks to the maximum extent feasible without the ability to apply state regulations within the LRA, where appropriate, as well as the SRA.

We currently live within the SRA and are thus already subject to the Title 14 fire regulations. We have noted with concern that abutting LRA lands, with fire hazards every bit as great as ours, are not currently subject to the same set of rules.

Ordinance 22-03 would enable these LRA zones to be treated in accordance with their true risks, allowing for appropriate measures to reduce fire dangers in both the SRA and the LRA, to the benefit of everyone. We urge you to adopt the ordinance.

#### Dear MOFD Board of Directors:

We wanted to follow up with additional information relevant to our comment letter of 2.16.22 (pasted below) regarding Ordinance 22-03.

Since that meeting, and in light of concerns raised regarding homeowners insurance, we spoke directly with two insurance agents including our State Farm agent, Jay Scott. Our takeaways from the conversation with Mr. Scott were as follows:

- State Farm has its own experts that calculate fire risk based on physical factors (e.g. topography, wind currents, vegetation, etc.) which form the inputs into their risk models. Mr. Scott does not expect local fire district maps to become a factor in these assessments.
- He was unequivocal that State Farm would not cancel anyone's policy or raise rates based on a change in the District's maps.
- State Farm welcomes any steps at the local level that will encourage safer, more fire-resistant homes.
- He said we may be eligible for a discount on our insurance premium thanks to the extensive fuels mitigation we've completed around our home and that we are part of a Firewise Community; he is sending us information about how to request that.

After that conversation, Suzanne also stopped by the newly opened State Farm office in Moraga, and spoke to agent Timi Adeyemo, who concurred with the points above as well.

As a result of these direct conversations with our insurance company, we are not concerned about our coverage should Ordinance 22-03 pass. We are, however, very concerned about construction in our area that does not comply with the State's current ember-resistant, emergency access and other hazard mitigation regulations.

Redesignating the District's LRA "high" fire severity zones to "very high" appears to be the most efficient and legally robust means by which to apply the State's Title 14 regulations promptly to areas which, we must all acknowledge, do objectively warrant that classification, and which will likely be so designated anyway when the State maps are updated.

As such, we strongly support passage of this ordinance. We live in an SRA zone that is already subject to the Title 14 regulations. This ordinance will bring neighboring LRA properties into conformity with the same strict regulations, making both our property and those of our neighbors safer in the face of the serious fire dangers we must now all manage together.

To the MOFD Board of Directors:

We are writing to express our support for the adoption of Ordinance 22-03. First, however, we want to express our sincere appreciation to the District for the critical work it is doing to help the Moraga-Orinda-Canyon community become better educated about and prepared for wildfire.

The District's outreach and support efforts—including the Chief's excellent community presentations explaining the risks, District staff's consultations to help residents improve defensible space, and the MOFD chipping program—have very directly helped us do a much better job preparing our home and our family to survive a wildfire.

We are also grateful for MOFD's ongoing work to secure funding for additional shaded firebreaks, and that it is collaborating with natural-resource agencies and organizations to take a balanced approach to protecting habitat and environmental resources while significantly reducing the ability of wildfire to spread through the community.

Within this context of MOFD's many efforts to respond adequately to rapidly increasing fire dangers, we write in support of Ordinance 22-03 before you tonight. As important as all the aforementioned strategies are, the District cannot mitigate our area's fire risks to the maximum extent feasible without the ability to apply state regulations within the LRA, where appropriate, as well as the SRA.

We currently live within the SRA and are thus already subject to the Title 14 fire regulations. We have noted with concern that abutting LRA lands, with fire hazards every bit as great as ours, are not currently subject to the same set of rules.

Ordinance 22-03 would enable these LRA zones to be treated in accordance with their true risks, allowing for appropriate measures to reduce fire dangers in both the SRA and the LRA, to the benefit of everyone. We urge you to adopt the ordinance.


Board, Chief Winnacker and District Secretary Holbrook:



Dear Director Jex and MOFD Board of Directors -

I live at 4008 Campolindo Dr in the Campolindo development of Moraga. I'm writing to ask you not to raise the fire danger designation for Moraga.

Our neighborhoods - certainly this is true in Campolindo - have already been highly proactive in fire mitigation over the past year and more. We have active wardens who advise homeowners on mitigation requirements and strategies and work actively to organize such activities. For example, my husband and I have just spent nearly \$10,000 in fuel break mitigation on a section of our property adjacent to the Lafayette Rim trail, specifically to protect against wildfire spreading. The evidence of this kind of continuous fire-wise activity is everywhere in our neighborhoods.

I believe that this is evidence of the already high fire safety consciousness in our town. To raise our fire danger status seems to risk punishing homeowners for the care and attention we already place on this issue, risking a potentially severe impact on future home sales and insurability. This cannot be good for the town; we need homeowners, and indeed the town as a whole, to be focused on fire safety implementation, not punitive designations.

We all take fire risk seriously, and we're all in this together. If more needs to be done, education and outreach, and where needed, enforcement, would seem to be more productive strategies rather than enacting ordinances that put our insurance statuses at risk.

Thank you for contacting the fire district.

In response to community sentiment this item was pulled from the agenda at last week's meeting and will not be revisited.

While future actions which may be taken by insurance carriers are unknowable, the extensive outreach and research conducted during the development of the proposed ordinance strongly suggested that the sophisticated models used to underwrite fire risk would not be influenced by an administrative change to a 15 year old map. To put it in the simplest terms possible, a carrier is unlikely to "discover" an overlooked case of fire risk in our community as a result of local ordinances. The ordinance was the only mechanism available to apply the state's fire safety to lot splits and, in my professional opinion, was worth pursuing. That said, it became apparent that community support was not widespread.

We continue our multi-year effort to bring the over 14,000 parcels in our community into compliance with the fire code and appreciate your support of this work.
